Model A Club Concours & Era Picnic 26th January 2020

40 individuals turned up to Rhodes Domain, Tai Tapu, for a beautiful Sunday Picnic, along with 16 Model A's and 2 moderns.

It was pleasing to see several new Model A'ers joining us for the first fixture of 2020.

On the good will of Rhodes in 1921 this domain was gifted to the people and now sits with a new Community Centre (at the cost of \$8 million). Tennis Courts, Bowls and the most popular 9 hole Golf Course in New Zealand.

The early Model Aers picked a lovely sheltered spot, under the shade of trees, this area turned out to be very popular, as we were joined by the Wolsey Car Club and some VCC Veterans, which made an attractive setting.

After a picnic lunch and a catch up, we all relaxed under the shade of the sheltering trees.

Backfiring Conditions:

Backfiring under load (throttle wide open at relatively low rpms) often indicates a problem in electrical/ignition/timing.

Culprits include:

Insufficient point gap (should be set at .018 to .020)

Timing

Bad condenser

Bad distributor body

Frayed wire between upper plate and lower plate on the distributor

Intermittent connection of the ignition switch

Backfiring with no-load (example: shifting between gears and coasting downhill). Often indicates too little fuel in combustion chamber for proper ignition. (During the exhaust stroke, raw gas is expelled into the muffler where it ignites)

Culprits include:

GAV adjusted to lean Intake vacuum leak Low carburetor float

Backfiring around 45 mph indicates insufficient fuel to supply the carburetor Clog in shut off valve

Gas line inserted too far into carburetor (adjust ferrule 3/32 of an inch or less)

Tip:

A quick and easy method to clear debris from the carburetor jets is to race the engine with the throttle rod, while simultaneously using your hand to pop the carburetor by covering the intake throat, keep removing your hand before it dies. This action creates a suction that usually dislodges debris from the carburetor jets.

STIFF STEERING.

If grease in the steering box is not causing the problem, another common cause of stiff steering is improperly shimmed spindle bearings. The replacement bearings are too thin and must be shimmed to the axle. If they are not, the weight of the car bears on the edges of the seal cups below the king pin, not the spindle bearing on top. To test it, see if you can rotate the bearing with the wheels on the ground. Properly set up, the bearings should rotate when the car is on stands with the wheels free, and not with the wheels on the ground. If the bearings turn by hand with weight on them, they need to be shimmed. Worn spindle balls also contribute to hard steering. If they are rough they create friction against the cups, and if they are egg shaped more than about .020, they will compress the tie rod and drag link end springs as you steer, adding to the effort required.

Yet another is the novice who tries to tighten the slop in the worm/sector gears by tightening the forward and back lash in the worm gear. The obvious locknut and bolt atop the box adjusts the fore and aft lash. If should be just to the point of no slop, not tight. But not knowing that, many people in the past have tightened it so far that the bearing races crack, creating drag on the worm gear. You can feel bad races as a crunching or grinding feel in the steering as you turn the wheel back and forth. Not much you can do about that but re build the box. A slight loosening of that bolt should create back and forth movement if you grab the steering wheel and push/pull it. If it takes a lot of loosening to get play in it, then someone tightened it too far once. It should be set just at the point where the play stops, and no further.

Less common is too little caster. On a stock Ford with original radius ball cups this is unusual, but I have been told of some mighty weird radius ball hangers. One had the ball stuffed up inside the hole in the flywheel housing with the upper cap inverted and tightened hard against the bottom of the ball with no springs or spacers. That would have eliminated the caster.

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
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
