14th National Model A Rally, Te Anau, New Zealand 15-19 April 2019

With the April 2017 Canterbury High Country Run, followed by the 13th National Model A Rally in Napier firmly in our memory, our expectations of the 14th National Model A Rally, based on Te Anau, were high.

Knowing a little of the rugged beauty of the terrain reading the advance schedule of runs, my wife Beverley and I, joined by my brother Frank from Los Angeles, were "re-united" with the Canterbury Club Car on 13 April, as we headed off from Christchurch in convoy with A Ford

Script Editor Graham and Anne Evans, along with John and Sandra Olliver. It was a real reunion, as we had hosted both the Evans's and Olliver's in October 2018 for the 25th National Model A Meet, based on Murray Bridge, South Australia.

Driving in a Phaeton, in contrast to a closed cab car, served up a reminder that the weather was definitely in late Autumn (Fall) mode, as we set out on our first day to Omarama, encountering other Model Aer's en-route.

Our second day was deep into the hinterland of the South Island as we travelled for an overnight at Cromwell, followed by a tourist Sunday in historic Arrowtown and tourist-mecca Queenstown, before arrival at Rally HQ in Te Anau in the picturesque region known as Fiordland.

Our 1928 Model A Phaeton behaved flawlessly in her first three days on the road, although her passengers increasingly dressed as if on something of an Antarctic adventure, wiping the ice and frost off the car each morning, before bracing for a day of crisp-air open motoring. It was everything one could hope for in re-creating the era of late 20s and early 30s motoring, that Kiwi Model Aer's know how to do so well.

After the Welcome Dinner on the Monday night, Tuesday 16 April was down to serious motoring. Our journey was to Walter Peak Station on the western side of Lake Wakatipu, where the iconic 1912 Edwardian steam-ship TSS Earnshaw daily brings tourists to marvel at the cloud and snow-covered mountains, descending into the mirror-like crystal clear waters of the lake. It was truly magical.

However, we did not arrive by steamer and the only road in was on what the Kiwis call a "metal" road in "good condition". For the uninitiated that means a grey gravel surface, with jagged rocks, that soon had all 140 cars participating covered in a fine grey dust that penetrated into every crevice known to a Model A

It was a return journey of 240 kilometres (150 miles) of tight mountain corners, heavy second-gear work for the ascents, with deft use of gear-box and brakes for the descents, with fords (no pun intended) as the means of traversing waterways, mingled with spectacular mountain and lake scenery that no tourist brochure could do adequate justice.

At Walter Peak Station many Model Aer's jostled to have their car photographed near the TSS Earnshaw - a delightful mix of boating history and early motoring that had the many tourists present in awe. There was also the added bonus, being a sheep station, of having to carefully negotiate the Kiwi equivalent of a traffic jam.

The return to Te Anau raised a serious problem for several participants, given that Wednesday 17 April was Concourse and Touring judging as well as the public display day. Cars that were pristine before setting out to Walter Peak Station returned looking like they had just emerged as barn-finds, meaning that many a participant was up late in the night endeavouring to restore their Model A's to some appearance of respectability prior to judging.

The final day of serious rallying on Thursday 18 April offered alternatives to Borland Saddle and Lake Manapouri South Arm, with rugged climbs and glorious scenery. Those on the longer tour of 208 kilometres (130 miles), were treated to a myriad of mountains, tipped with the first winter snows, glorious lakes and many of New Zealand's somewhat unique one-lane bridges over deep ravines and fast-flowing rivers. TECHNICAL TIPS

ALIGNING FLYWHEEL AND HOUSING

Proper aligning of flywheel and housing is of extreme importance as miss alignment can be attributed to many vibration and problems.

- 1. Mount flywheel housing to block with gasket and or thin bead of RTV. Install four $7/16-14 \times 1 \times 1/16$ cross drilled hex bolts and safety wire. Note if any flywheel housing bolt holes in block are open into crankcase it is suggested to use a small amount of RTV on threads of bolt. This will reduce oil leakage into flywheel housing.
- 2. Place two .010 shims, I under each of the two mounting lugs on top of flywheel housing and install bolts and tighten.
- 3. Mount indicator (Pictured below) on rear of crankshaft and measure around diameter of flywheel housing. Adjust by adding or subtracting shims. Recheck measurement. Less than .010 is desired not always obtainable left to right.
- 4. Mount flywheel to crankshaft with four 7/16-20x 13/16 cross drilled hex bolts and dowel pin retainer. Using too long of bolts can cause severe damage to engine. Tighten bolts do not install safety wire or pilot bearing.
- 5. Mount indicator on flywheel housing and measure run out near outer edge of clutch surface. Adjust by loosing flywheel bolts and pry flywheel from crankshaft. Install shim between crankshaft and flywheel where necessary.

Tighten bolts and recheck measurement. This should be less than .005

- 6. Install safety wire and pilot bearing.
- 7. Reference FORD Service bulletins page 218.



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
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
