Authentically Speaking.

Steering difficulties and remedies.

A seven tooth box has the same play no matter what position the wheel is in.

A two tooth Gemmer steering box is designed to have no play, or the least amount of play at the straight ahead position and <u>increasing</u> amounts of play either side of top dead center.

With either type of steering box, take firm hold of the Pitman arm (located under the front guard) and shake firmly up and down to feel any play.

If just the slightest amount of play is detected, or the Pitman arm moves up and down, this indicates the sector bushes are worn and will need replacing. This play cannot be removed with

any of the adjustments.



If the Pitman arm is not secure on the sector shaft, it will mimic steering box wear and greatly add to play at the wheel. Make sure the shaft is good and tight on the shaft before checking the sector bushes for wear by way of shaking the Pitman arm.

The same applies to the radius rod connection at the bellhousing under the car and at the rear of the pan. This mounting is spring loaded and must be in good order and secure to remove play at the wheel. See next page.

Tip.

Check the two steering box to frame mounting bolts. If they are loose and often they are, it will mimic play or sector wear. These two bolts (pictured at left,) are situated either side of the top of the Pitman arm. The bolt holes in the frame can also be slogged, and even after tightening the bolts, there can still be movement. The only way is to repair the slogged holes.

Difficult Steering. le hard to steer, or excess play at the steering wheel.

 The four balls (total) on the steering ball joints could easily be out of round. Very common after 80 odd years of use. New balls can be fitted. Get serious advise first.
 This is a safety issue. Find a certified welder for this work. Suppliers have steering balls.

The thrust bearing under each king pin may not be taking the bearing load of the axle, with the weight being transferred to the bottom of the king pin. Common.

- The steering box may be lacking lubricant, or filled with grease. EP 360 gear oil should be added. No need to remove the grease, just add oil.
- Tires could be under inflated or incorrectly installed on the rim. 32 to 36 lbs/sq in is ideal.
- Tow in and out. Check adjustment.
- Bent front axle. Look for a better one.
- Bent tie rod or drag link. Both bars should be straight.
- Sagging front spring. Very common. See if the tie rod and drag link are touching where they cross over each other and may have worn a flat on each other. A sure sign the spring has sagged and lost it's temper. Stand back from the front of the car and see if the front axle is visible under the radiator valance. If you can't see the axle, it is another sign the spring need attention. The spring would have to be removed and sent to a 'spring shop' or see your supplier. A sagging spring alters the front end geometry.

- Incorrect adjustment of the steering box, either 2 or 7 tooth.
- Badly worn or broken roller bearings in a 2 tooth steering box. The 7 tooth has two
 roller thrust bearings either end of the worm which seldom give trouble.
- Steering box lose on the frame. More common than most people think.

The Front Radius Rod Ball Connection.

To achieve correct and easy steering, this ball joint has to be in good order and assembled and tightened correctly as outlined below.


Exploded view at right.

Sleeves are supplied with your kit. These sleeves isolate the springs from the threaded studs.

If worn ALWAYS replace the radius rod ball connection with new. See suppliers. This unit is situated at the base of the bellhousing, where the two radius rods from the front axle meet. Complete steel ball joints are available from all suppliers, and cheap to purchase. Never use a rubber ball fitting, as the castings required to accommodate the ball can fracture. The two protruding studs can be replaced (with some difficulty with the bellhousing installed) if found to be faulty. Correct spring tension on the two studs is obtained when the split pin is able to be pushed through the tightened nut and the stud. Lubricate with grease before assembly. Shims are available to compensate for ball wear. The unit is self. Jubricating.

The Front Axle.

Problems with the axle and surrounding parts can be numerous, depending on 80 odd years or damage and wear. Problems are mainly concerned with steering are mentioned above.

- Bent axle. Requires a hydraulic press to straighten. Usually any bend is backwards and the bend is at the perch bolt, the weakest part of the axle. This can be straightened in a press.
- Perch bolt eye and king pin eye wear. Both of these areas can wear and would require bushing by an engineer. The king pin passes through the end of the axle and wear here can mimic king pin play. This wear is best detected with the axle removed and stripped, where the king pin on it's own can be pushed through the eyelet to feel for wear. A good way of detecting axle eyelet straightness is to pass a 13/16" x three foot round bar through each eyelet and stand back and sight along the two. The same system applies to the perch bolt eyelets.





Always use good axle stands, and before removing the wheels, shake the car to see if it is stable on the

We have printed the annual run organiser for the coming events in this script.

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
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
