

## **AUTENTICALLY SPEAKING**

# What's at the bottom of your steering box? This article shows all parts, and how this original switch operates your headlights.



Firstly, to get all the components working correctly, the light switch lever at the centre of the steering wheel must be in the vertical position. (if not, all is lost)

Switch components. Removal is below.



Spring, spider and circlip.







Switch end of the horn ron to which the components at left are affixed.













There were two types of switch contact plate configurations used during production.
At left, single bulb. 2 wires to each headlight.
At right 2 bulb and 3 wires to each headlight.

To install the appropriate parts to the end of the horn rod, they must be assembled in the correct order as at right.

There were different lengths of horn rods. B rod is for the 7 tooth. The rest are 2 tooth with C being 28-29 (Gemmer) and the rest 30 or 31.

A-3616-B = 44-1/2"

A-3616-C = 43"


A-3616-F = 44-1/2"

A-3616-G = 43"

A-3616-H = 44" B rod for 7 tooth

The rest are 2 tooth with C being 28-29 (Gemmer) and the rest 30 or 31.

There a trick to getting the horn button and light switch assembly off the steering wheel. If it's pulled down tight then the "spring/spider/keeper" are in place at the bottom.



## **Member Contribution by Les Pearson**

You need to remove the headlight switch body which is done by undoing the bail. Then pull directly in line with the column "down." The switch body will remove en-mass and hang on its wires. (don't try to open the switch body unless you like tinkering to get it back together.)

With the switch removed, you should see the two fingers of the **spider**. In the centre of the **spider** is its "keeper" which is a small steel circle washer with a "slot" which allows it to be placed/removed.

Use a thin wooden stick between your steering wheel circumference and crossing across the horn button. This will hold the switch rod/horn button "down" as far as it will go and allow you to work elsewhere unassisted. (A patient wife/girlfriend can allow you to delete this step - it's a two minute job where you go next once you understand what you're trying to do.)

Then "push up" on the **spider** only which has a spring above it. With the **spider** pushed up, you uncover and see its keeper. Find it's slot and remove the keeper.

Then the **spider** and spring can both be removed from the bottom of the switch rod.

THEN your fun begins in trying to "back" the switch rod OUT of the steering column.

For closed automobiles generally the inside dimensions of the cab may prevent this. You can unbolt the steering box from the frame AND unbolt the steering column from the gas tank support and "drop" the column to get more room. On open cars the withdrawing of the switch rod is direct and quick with the top down.

#### Assembly of components.

See the diagram on the previous page. Before installing the horn rod into the top of the wheel there is a small but very important anti rattle shim which must be installed firstly. (If not, the horn rod will rattle and drive you to distraction). Shim pictured, arrowed.



Assembly if all the components are lined up is quite simple. No need to force anything as they will virtually fall into place





Everything must line up as per the dotted line. (If not, you are in deep strife.)

The vertical spider forks will fit into the switch, if the switch body is in the correct position as below.





**Fitting the bail wire.** Be careful as there were a few different bail wire configurations and lengths. If your bail wire is new or a good second hand and not the bail wire that was on your switch from before, be very careful. The tension of the bail onto the switch body determines the way the switch




lever at the steering wheel works. Too much pressure on the switch means you will hardly be able to rotate the switch lever and may do damage, and too little the switch will not work at all. The bail wire attaches to the two lugs as pictured left which are part of the steering box and clips below the switch

body.





#### DO YOU KNOW THE MODEL "A"?

A Course of Questions with Detailed Answers Covering
Various Mechanical Phases of the NEW FORD.

#### ARTICLE 5.

#### THE TRANSMISSION.

Question 5. What kind of bearings are used on the Transmission Main Shaft? Why?

**Answer 5**. Ball bearings of large size are used on the transmission main shaft, because of their effectiveness in carrying both radial loads and also a certain amount of end thrust, which is imposed on the forward bearing when the clutch is disengaged. The rear ball bearing positions the rear end of the transmission main shaft.

Question 6. What kind of bearing is used in the main shaft pilot bearing? Why?

**Answer 6.** A Hyatt type roller bearing is used in the main shaft "pilot" bearing (where the spline shaft is carried in the drive shaft) as the load at this point is radial only, and no provision for end thrust need be made. The roller bearing is more compact, and so fits very nicely in the limited space available.

Question 7. What kind of bearings are used in transmission counter shaft or cluster gear assembly? Why?

**Answer 7.** The countershaft or cluster gear assembly is carried on roller bearings because of their extreme efficiency in carrying radial loads, such as are exerted on these gears. The roller bearings are compact and fit neatly inside the cluster gear assembly, without requiring the cluster gears to be cut away to allow space for the bearings.

Question 8. What kind of bearing is used in reverse idler gear? Why?

**Answer 8.** The reverse idler gear is mounted on a bronze bushing since this gear is so little used (perhaps less than  $\frac{1}{10}$  of one per cent. of the distance) that there is no need for mounting it on ball bearings. When reverse gear is in use, the reverse idler gear is used in "addition" to the cluster gear shaft so that all FIVE of the anti-friction ball and roller bearings are in use. Thus the FORD construction greatly reduces friction and wear-even in reverse gear.

Question 9. What is the length of the bearings used in pilot bearing and in the cluster gear bearings?

**Answer 9.** The Hyatt type roller bearing used in the main shaft pilot bearing is  $1^{1}/_{2}$  in. long. The two Hyatt type roller bearings used in the cluster gear assembly are  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  in and  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  in long respectively.

## The Jenny Railcar

The West Side Lumbar Company of California converted several Model As into railcars which could carry 12 people. A few still see regular service on the Yosemite Mountain Sugar Pine Railroad today, also in California.

## **CAR \* TOON TRUCK**

The idea for the truck came about in 2001 when I purchased an unrestored, original 1929 Ford Model A Closed Cab Pickup with 40 k original miles, a survivor. With this kind of unique vehicle you just leave it as is and enjoy it for what it is. But as an artist, I wanted to paint something, so I settled for restoring antique license plates. As it turned out, fortune would be at my side again. I was able to locate the truck's mate, a 1929 Ford Model A Town Sedan Delux, also an unrestored original with 20k original miles. These two vehicles were found together sitting for over 50 years and had been owned by the same family and were parted — I got the two SURVI-VORS back together. But still had nothing to paint! Going to car shows the pair would always gather a small crowd. The Customs



and Hot Rods would always steal the show. I wanted the little Model A some how to out shine them. I purchased a 1928 Ford Model AR Roadster Pickup restoring it to 1928 standards. When trucks left the factory and became commercial workers, the paint matched the owners business, such as COKE or the local plumber. I could paint my little Roadster and still be true to its history. As an airbrush artist painting custom motorcycles, helmets and race cars...but it's the same ole' stuff. This time, this one is for me! Cartoons became the most logical idea, since little kids, seniors citizens and just about everybody has their favorite and I love comics, A rolling piece of art and history! I soon learned there was nothing out there which exhibited ALL CARTOONS. I now had my show car that no one would even attempt to copy. Needless to say, the research was quite a task with countless hours.

A HISTORICAL DOCUMENTARY ON COMICS from "The Yellow Kid" Oct. 18, 1896 until the present day! Timing would have it, after repairing the steering box, removing the engine (to replace the clutch plate) and body work then epoxy white primer, white base coat and two coats of clear, I was ready to start drawing. It's now Oct 15, 2004, I waited three days to start on the very day the first comic was ever published. I put The Yellow Kid on the back of the side mirror. My target date was July 2005 to start showing it and its reaction. —I finished 90% of it on time, with over 2,000 hours of airbrush painting...not counting research time.

FIND NEMO & WHERE'S WALDO were scattered over the truck for fun .. The paint is all House of Kolor Paint, Kandy Apple Colors ,clear coated .. The truck was about FINISHED in Jan. 07 with 2500 hours. Not really , I kept adding all the new cartoons being released . It has become a never ending work of art, Now over 2800 hours by the end of 2010. Needless to say, WOW! Everyone loves it ...AMAZING is the word most used and thank you so much for the enjoyment it creates. A nice thing is, that it was featured in Automobile Magazine and on the cover of Car & Parts Magazine and many more
