On Saturday morning, 67 Model A's from all over the South Island, plus one from Hamilton, rolled into the Hornby WMC car park to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the first Canterbury Model A Club run.

After meeting up with friends old and new, including Mark and Debby Smith who had come from Hamilton area to be with us, we were handed our rally directions and sent off at one minute intervals to hopefully find our way to the lunch stop.

The route took us through some of the Christchurch suburbs and out to Lincoln. On the way we had to drive between Halswell and Lincoln check points at a set average speed (goodness knows what it was !). All cars had photos taken—many on the white line—as we viewed at the evening meal on the BIG screen !

We continued on through Coes Ford, where many stopped for morning tea, and lakeside to Southbridge. At the check point we were given 20 seconds too scan and memorise a board of Model A parts, then onto another checkpoint where we had to recall as many of those parts as we could.

Our final stop was Rakaia Huts—the same place as the first Model A run in 1965 —where we had lunch, socialised and admired the line up of cars.

For the return to Christchurch we were given several routes of varying lengths. On the scenic route home over the Port Hills, the Jeffersons had the misfortune to lose a fan blade through the radiator, which lead to a recovery operation using a Model A to lower the car down the hills with a rope from behind, and then conventional towing on the flat.

It was a great "A" day, well organised and very enjoyable. A big thank to those who planned the rally and manned the check points. Well done!

LOOKING BACK

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

This month we are looking back just a few weeks to the club's 50th Anniversary Celebration. One of our speakers at the Saturday night dinner was Alan Wills. Alan was one of the five MAFCA members who formed the Canterbury NZ Chapter in 1965.

Alan has kindly agreed to have his speech published in the A Ford Script. Here it is -

Good evening members and fellow enthusiasts – for those of you who can't read my name tag from up here ,my name is Alan Wills ,sole remaining founder member ,and life member of the Chapter.

I will start my brief little message with a rhetorical question;

Why are we here tonight ,why this weekend ,why at all?

We are here because of one mans vision to bring Model A Fords into the mainstream of the Vintage car movement.

In the 1960s the Vintage Car Club was very much focussed on veteran vehicles, and I might add anything with a posh sounding English or European name.

Model Ts were tolerated (just) Model As were treated with disdain by many of the old school, and that attitude persisted for years with them being only 'half-pie' acceptable.

LET ME EXPLAIN WHY WE ARE MEETING HERE IN 2015.

In the VCC in the early 60s we gathered to socialize in our Clubrooms in Colwyn St. Bryndwr .and it was at one of those monthly social occasions that the late Peter Keir drew me aside with a proposition .

Now Shirley and I were vintage motorcycle enthusiasts with a small collection of Harley Davidsons from the 1920s .but ,more importantly I had a Model A Pickup for my panel beating business. It was sign written from "stem to stern' (and looking at it know perhaps a little overdone), but this over decorated little truck had a place in the Grand Plan.

We will call it 'Peters Plan'.....it was simple enough .Peter ,a long time devotee like no other I have ever met, used a Model A as everyday transport, was a member of the Model A Ford Club of America, and been in touch with the Chapter co-ordinator about forming a Chapter in NZ.

I don't know what their first reaction was (because there were no Chapters out side of the USA/Canada) however they must have considered that the same criteria that applied to Chapters in the USA would suffice for an overseas one.

The rules were 'If five full members of MAFCA made written application to the parent body to form a separate group it would fulfil all the statutory obligations.'

This is where my truck fitted into the scheme of things.

Peter had befriended a retired gentleman in Highstead Rd. with a Cabriolet ,Harry Barnes ,he got along side a neighbour from near Rakaia, Bob Marshall .Now with Peter ,Harry ,Bob ,and myself he was almost there .Did I know of any other owner who would be prepared to join MAFCA to make up the numbers.

Yes, I did, the local farmer from whom I had purchased my first Harley had a Coupe in his shed and Harry Williamson was press-ganged to make up the numbers.

History confirms that we were successful and the Canterbury NZ Chapter was the first overseas group to claim that title.

Very quickly we gathered up foundation members ,and we have Garth Moore and Robin Fear as two of these first recruits here this weekend.

Peter was A to the core ,loved them with a passion ,bordering on obsessive ,and we became good friends ,even at times partners, purchasing derelict As for the sole purpose of systematically dismantling and redistributing parts to the ever growing group of enthusiasts that quickly formed in those early days.

Model As were expendable items ,for example, the Milkman from Tinwald South Ashburton delivered from a trailer towed behind a Fordor .He chugged along in second gear on the hand throttle while he ran to and from with his bottles ,single handedly until the steering needed a small correction ,or a corner came up.

Understandably this was very hard on transmissions and diffs. and as a consequence Peter and I were able to aquire two such vehicles for next to no cost .Both had terminal differential problems .

We saved every Robertson headed screw ,every window hold open knurled knob (for even then they were shedding their plating), door handles ,escutcheons ,window finishers ,blind roller parts ,interior lights and switches ,every single item was kept for passing on to others.

Peter also had collected for one of his future projects a Cragar overhead valve engined car with an enormous sump that had been raced at Wigram by the late David Habgood.

There would not have been many cars restored during those formulative years that did not benefit from this trove of bits and pieces.

The humble Model A had very little value unrestored ,and one December the Bursar of Lincoln Agricultural College ,(this was before it gained University status) called me and asked if I could come and remove a Model A Roadster from the students car park ,left there by a departing student and the end of his final semester.

They were 35 years old, too old to be current ,and not yet old or scarce enough to have large amounts of money spent on them to restore .

Not unlike picking up an HQ Holden or a 120Y today.

Nowhow does the old vehicle movement regard the A today..

The Model A Ford has been well and truly vindicated, loved and admired by all ,and it is in no small way that it has been the Peter Keirs ,and you enthusiasts here continuing to restore ,preserve ,and most importantly drive ,the best vintage era vehicle ever built that has guaranteed its rightful place in history. *AlanWills*

FOOTNOTE As the club has now commenced its second fifty years, this is the last "Looking Back" article. Perhaps I will do the same prior to the 100th Anniversary!
